
Dear Friends,

# INTRODUCTION

## MISSION

The WJCC Schools Foundation partners with the community to provide resources that enrich teaching and inspire learning in helping our public schools toward education excellence for all students.

## HISTORY

Established by the WJCC School Board in 2015 as an independent nonprofit organization, the WJCC Schools Foundation has successfully supported many education projects that would not have otherwise been possible. Since its inception, the Schools Foundation has awarded funding for Innovative Learning Grants through a formal application and blind review process designed to give teachers access to funding for their inspired ideas. It has been an overwhelming success, exposing students to ideas and methods not currently available and providing teachers with additional tools to fulfill their visions for student accomplishment.

The WJCC Schools Foundation is a 20+ member volunteer board of directors, one staff member, and countless volunteers that works hand-in-hand with WJCC Public Schools to support the education goals of today. Virtually every student is touched by our Innovative Learning Grants, because many of the grants get duplicated from one classroom to another, and some transfer to other schools or are repeated year after year, demonstrating that the grants impact classrooms and students in countless ways and for many years.

Examples of grant impacts are the drones, which have given elementary students not only flying experience, but also trained them in the computer coding necessary to fly. A hydroponic garden has given practical biology instruction and demonstrated to students how aquaculture can help meet future food needs. A complete “green room” for journalism has been constructed in the media center at one school, complete with professional recording, photo, and video equipment. As a result, two WJCC students were recognized finalists in the NPR Student Podcast Challenge. And there’s much more! From soft skills to hard data, these students now know the terminology, practice the skills, and operate the equipment that will make them more confident to succeed in a changing world.

Having an organization dedicated exclusively to WJCC Public Schools was a clear advantage when COVID-19 forced a quick shift from traditional classroom education to online instruction. Without time to prepare, students were ill equipped to learn from home. In early 2020, the Schools Foundation was able to provide a \$20K technology grant for laptops and helped to establish a partnership through Williamsburg Regional Library for WiFi access to keep students engaged with their classes.



# IMPACT

Constantly in pursuit of education excellence, the Schools Foundation Board of Directors voted to expand the types of programs funded. Building on the success of the Innovative Learning Grants, the board moved to sponsor two new initiatives: the Teacher of the Year Awards and a Teacher Supply Shop.

## INNOVATIVE LEARNING GRANTS

The Innovative Learning Grant has been the flagship program of the Schools Foundation and since 2015 has awarded over \$300,000 in grants to more than 150 teachers. The grants have been distributed throughout all 17 schools and reached every grade level. Any of these grant projects has the potential to spark interest in a future career and to introduce the skills necessary for that career. *The 2022 Innovative Learning Grants are listed beginning on page 5.*

## WJCC SCHOOLS TEACHER OF THE YEAR

Sponsoring the WJCC Schools Teacher of the Year celebration aligns perfectly with the Schools Foundation mission to “provide resources . . . in helping our [WJCC] public schools toward education excellence for all students.” These teachers are exemplars of educational excellence fulfilling the goals to “enrich teaching and learning” for their students in their respective classrooms and schools. This new initiative acknowledges and celebrates all of WJCC’s outstanding public school teachers for their dedication to student success. *The 2022 Teachers of the Year are listed on page 9.*

## TEACHER SUPPLY SHOP

With a \$10,000 donation, the WJCC Schools Foundation was instrumental in kick starting the new Teacher Supply Shop created to serve as a one-stop resource for teachers, librarians, social workers, and other division staff members to access free school supplies. It is estimated that over 90% of teachers spend their own money to supplement their students’ classroom needs, but now in WJCC they will have an alternative source for those materials. In the shop’s first week of operation, teachers placed over 300 orders, which is clear evidence that there is a need for this resource. *Read more on page 13.*





## OUR FINANCIALS

In 2022, we raised \$57,194 from 87 donors comprised of individuals, Partners (businesses, foundations, and interest), and Board members. Funds added for future Grants and Awards: \$6,116.

- We awarded 15 new Innovative Learning Grants to 29 teachers, totaling \$37,321.
- We recognized 28 Teachers of the Year, totaling \$6,150.
- Other expenses came to \$4,962.

Board donations covered expenses, enabling 100% of donations to directly support funding of grants and awards for teachers and schools.



# INNOVATIVE LEARNING GRANTS 2022

## Watering Up Instruction with Shared Reading

Clara Byrd Baker Elementary School (Alison Cobb, Kristi Pritchett, Michelle Weatherwax, Tamara Williams, Jackie Woodroffe)

Shared Reading is an interactive reading experience that occurs when students share the reading of a book while guided and supported by a teacher. The teacher explicitly models the skills of proficient readers, including reading with fluency and expression. This grant will supply oversized books (referred to as big books) with enlarged print and illustrations to be used for Shared Reading. National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) data shows that only 34% of students are reading at a proficient level, and the gap for our varied subgroups continues to widen. Shared Reading is a method that helps children develop fluency, vocabulary, comprehension, and knowledge while also teaching them content.



## Practice Makes Perfect

Laurel Lane Elementary School (Ellen Frackelton, Katie Moore)

Students who are just beginning to read benefit from opportunities to decode words using the known letter sounds and patterns. This is vital to emergent readers and is supported by the National Reading Panel's findings: "The intent of providing books that match children's letter-sound knowledge is to enable them to experience success in decoding words that follow the patterns they know" (National Reading Panel, 2000, p. 2-97). This grant will provide books designed with specific opportunities for decoding and problem solving by using and building on patterns.

## DJ-ing in the Elementary Music Room

Matthew Whaley Elementary School (Jordan Stehle)

Learning to layer electronic sounds in the elementary general music classroom is an innovative application for the development of musical literacy. This grant will enable the creation of a whole new unit of discovery in which students can explore elements of 21st century music using tools and technology in line with the artists we hear on the radio today, making it an experience students find exciting and relevant.



repetitive text. These leveled readers present graduated levels of difficulty which build students' confidence while increasing comprehension, vocabulary, close reading of text, and more.

## Learning to Read with Authentic, Interesting Texts

Matoaka Elementary School (Lindsay Lord)

Due to Covid-19 students have missed too many days in a brick-and-mortar school setting with books in their hands, resulting in a learning gap that is larger now than it has been in years. Through this grant, teachers and school interventionists will be provided with effective instructional materials to help bridge these achievement gaps.

Leveled readers appeal to the interest of children with engaging illustrations and help children to guess at unfamiliar words using either context or picture clues. Leveled readers include many high-frequency words (sometimes called sight words) and often incorporate

### Engaging Kindergarten Students in Multi-Sensory Phonics Instruction

Stonehouse Elementary School (April Farulli, Dawn Padden, Ronda Vickerton, Michelle Bonner, Stephanie Allen, Kelianne Coffman, Casey Bailey)

Students arrive to kindergarten with a range of strengths and areas for growth, especially in skills like phonological awareness and letter sound knowledge. This grant will enhance the phonics instruction already provided by purchasing decodable readers, phonics activities, and manipulatives for multisensory engagement in phonics and phonological awareness instruction. With these resources, teachers will create opportunities for fun, hands-on word level instruction that will help instill a love for reading with a stronger retention of letters and sounds, and foundation for future reading success.

### York River Environmental Study

Stonehouse Elementary School (Jodye Harris)

In this field trip to York River State Park, 3rd grade students will participate in seining, ecosystem exploration, and talks from park rangers. With this, students will investigate and understand that adaptations allow organisms to satisfy life needs and respond to the environment and that aquatic and terrestrial ecosystems support a diversity of organisms.



### Reading Room Rejuvenation

Stonehouse Elementary School (Amy Hicks)

This grant supports the purchase of books for the school's reading room collection used to support classroom libraries and take-home reading programs. Children at young ages 'love' their books hard, and consequently the books need to be replaced and replenished frequently



### Learning to See Each Other

Stonehouse Elementary School (Dawn Estrin)

Through the guided process of creating photographic portraits using a digital camera, backdrop, and digital imaging tools, students will see themselves and experience each other differently. A good portrait involves photo and lighting gear, but it also requires a distinct effort to connect with the subject, so they are at ease with the image-making process. It can include identifying the portrait subject's interests—everything from their pastime activities to playing their favorite music during the shoot to make them feel more relaxed. This experience supports technical skills of photography along with social and emotional learning, a current value important to the strategic goals of

WJCC schools. The project will culminate in an exhibition of mounted large format portraits in the school and a community viewing online event.

# INNOVATIVE LEARNING GRANTS 2022

## Empowering Students Through Coding

James Blair Middle School (Patrice Lambusta)

Ozobot is a smart robot that can follow lines or roam around freely, detect colors, and can be programmed using visual codes. It provides students with an engaging platform to learn about robotics, math, and programming while problem-solving with others. Due to the pandemic, students lost the opportunity to practice and grow their social skills through collaborative lessons and activities. Ozobot teaches them in a fun way, so they learn while being engaged and playing.

Additionally, this project will support WJCC

Strategic Goal 2: Educational Equity by ensuring an equitable learning experience for all students.



## Outdoor Classroom Shade Structure Installation

Toano Middle School (Lindsey Ambrose)

This cover will provide shade to an outdoor learning environment constructed through a previous grant awarded by the Schools Foundation called "Camp Sunshine." In 2020, the Schools Foundation funded portable solar power banks, rugged camp chairs and folding lap desks. Williams Landscape and Design donated much of the materials and labor. The addition of a triangular canopy to provide protection from the sun's heat and harmful UV rays is an upgrade that will increase utility of the outdoor classroom now and for years to come.

## Sin Fronteras

Jamestown High School and Matoaka Elementary School (Alisa Smith [JHS] and Debbie Erwin [Matoaka ES])

Delivering Latin American cultural awareness and appreciation through this program exposes participants to the Spanish language and culture and allows for unique artwork creations. Sin Fronteras is a multi-cultural art program that connects 5th graders with high school students to promote and explore various Latin American art styles and techniques using a combination of world language, technology, and art supplies, and culminating in a presentation of mini-projects. The program provides elementary and high school students with the opportunity to learn about Latin American art styles in an interactive, artistic manner and enables students to create art based on what they are learning.




## Using an iPadcaster System in the Classroom

Berkeley Middle School (Linda Gallant)

The inclusion of the iPadcaster technology for measuring growth in the theatre classroom will expand technology access for the student to self-reflect on their performance of skills as they document their progress. The addition of digital media technology will also enhance the development of 21st Century career skills. All the components from the iPadcaster frame, to the tripod, lenses, and microphones are professional grade and will be used for years of video production.

## INNOVATIVE LEARNING GRANTS 2022



### Portable Green Screens

Jamestown High School (Kristin Cosby)

Video projects encourage collaboration and heightened student engagement and as a result more teachers are incorporating video projects in their classroom activities. 'Green Screening' is easy to do, it works in lots of subject areas and grade levels and offers unlimited opportunities for students to engage with their studies. A solid green screen is placed behind the subject of the video, which in many cases is a person. Once the initial filming has been done, special software allows the video editor to replace everything that appears green on the video with a still image or another video. When students put themselves into green screen projects—

whether it's to take on the role of a character in a book, an investigator, or anything else—their bodies and emotions are actively participating in the learning process, which deepens their exploration into a subject.

### English Learners Expeditions

Jamestown High School (Tamara Priestley)

The modern classroom is no longer constrained by four walls. Educators need to be able to meet their students where they are—and take them to places they've never been before. Virtual reality (VR) provides immersive context to a lesson and can be more accessible to nontraditional learners. Most of our English Learners come from economically underprivileged backgrounds and a significant number have had limited or interrupted education. With an increase in the number of English Learners in school, this grant will establish a series of 'Virtual Reality Expeditions' to meet the unique needs of these students. Virtual Reality tools expose students to a variety of experiences in the Sciences, Arts, Social Studies, and Literacy. Augmented reality is changing the education landscape and delivering an immersive learning experience that helps students to thrive.



### Multi-Lingual Learners: Cooking for Culture

Lafayette High School (Suzanne Sylvester, Jennifer Marzana, Christopher Schroeder)


Learning language through food is a recipe for success on so many different levels. Multi-Lingual learners will be given the opportunity to cook traditional cuisine enjoyed by cultures from around the world, allowing for project-based learning that combines the process of learning language and cultures with the fun and excitement of cooking! It requires reading a recipe, measuring and mixing ingredients, and it uses all five senses. Students get to eat a nutritious and flavorful meal while learning to appreciate other cultures.

## WJCC SCHOOLS TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARDS

We value all of our teachers and appreciate what they do to support students and families. By recognizing a few of them, we hope to encourage all of them. Some of WJCC's most outstanding teachers in 2022 were recognized by the Schools Foundation in an awards ceremony held at the William & Mary School of Education with hundreds in attendance. Seventeen veteran teachers and eleven "Rookie" teachers were recognized with WJCC Schools Foundation monogrammed polo shirts, trophy-style classroom medallions, and cash awards totaling over \$6,000. Stephanie Kline is the 2022 Williamsburg James City County Division Teacher of the Year, Emily Cobb is awarded the Middle School Teacher of the Year, Jerome Rhodes is the High School Teacher of the Year, and Patrick Rayvon is recognized as the Rookie Teacher of the Year.


