



We are involved, concerned citizens - parents, grandparents, current and former business and community leaders - all working to provide the catalyst for innovative programs.



INTRODUCTION

MISSION

The WJCC Schools Foundation partners with the community to provide resources that enrich teaching and inspire learning in helping our public schools toward education excellence for all students.

HISTORY

Established by the WJCC School Board in 2015 as an independent nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization, the WJCC Schools Foundation has successfully supported many projects that otherwise would not have been possible. We operate with a 15+ member volunteer board of directors, one staff member, and countless volunteers who work hand-in-hand with WJCC Public Schools to support the education goals of today.

Since its inception, the Schools Foundation has awarded funding for Innovative Learning Grants through a formal application and blind review process designed to give teachers access to funding for their inspired ideas. It has been an overwhelming success, exposing students to ideas and methods not currently available and providing teachers with additional tools to fulfill their visions for student accomplishment.

Virtually every student is touched by these Innovative Learning Grants. Many of the grant projects get duplicated from one classroom to another, and some transfer to other schools or are repeated year after year, demonstrating that the grants impact classrooms and students in countless ways and for many years. From soft skills to hard data, students learn the terminology, practice the skills, and operate the equipment that will make them more confident and able to succeed in a changing world.

Having an organization dedicated exclusively to WJCC Public Schools was a clear advantage when COVID-19 forced a quick shift from traditional classroom education to online instruction. Without time to prepare, students were ill equipped to learn from home. In early 2020, the Schools Foundation was able to provide a \$20K technology grant for laptops and helped establish a partnership through Williamsburg Regional Library for Wi-Fi access to keep students engaged with their classes.

IMPACT

INNOVATIVE LEARNING GRANTS

In 2023 we awarded \$34,350 in grants to teachers for their inspired classroom projects. The Innovative Learning Grant is the flagship program of the Schools Foundation, and since 2015 we have awarded over \$314,504 in teacher-initiated grant funding to more than 175 teachers. The grants are distributed to classrooms throughout all 17 schools and at every grade level, Pre-K through 12. It is hard to measure the breadth and reach or the differences these interventions make in the lives of our students, but reading some of their testimonials and seeing them smile from ear to ear as they describe how their teachers make learning fun says it all! *The 2023 Innovative Learning Grants are listed beginning on page 5.*

ENRICHING START-UPS

\$12,655 went to the Teacher Supply Shop, a one-stop resource for educators to obtain classroom supplies at no cost to them. The National Center for Educational Statistics reports that 94% of teachers annually spend \$500-\$1,000 of their own money on school supplies. This program relieves WJCC Schools teachers, librarians, social workers, and other division staff members from that financial burden while also ensuring that students have the tools essential for learning.

\$20,000 was invested in a Summer FUN enrichment class for elementary students to experience additional instruction at James River Elementary School. WJCC Schools serves more than 1,000 students each summer. Programming for this subset of students gave hands-on experiences aligned with student interests to increase student motivation and foster a love of learning.

INSPIRING AWARDS

\$6,000 makes us the lead sponsor of the Teacher of the Year celebration held each May at the Art Museums of Colonial Williamsburg. The WJCC Schools Foundation presents a monetary gift, letter of commendation, and commemorative medallion to each of the 17 superstar teachers, one from each school, while their families, peers, and local dignitaries applaud them for their dedication to excellent teaching.





2023 FINANCIALS

In 2023, we raised \$60,378 from 106 donors comprised of individuals, Partners (businesses, foundations, and interest groups), and Board members.

- We awarded 19 Innovative Learning Grants to teachers, totaling \$34,350.
- We recognized 17 Teachers of the Year, totaling \$6,000.
- We funded a Summer FUN Grant for 60 students, totaling \$20,000
- We helped stock the Teacher Supply Store, totaling \$12,655.
- We incurred \$9,822 in operating expenses.

Board donations covered operating expenses, enabling 100% of all other donations to directly support funding of grants and awards for teachers and schools.

INNOVATIVE LEARNING GRANTS 2023

On Valentine's Day, the WJCC Schools Foundation Board and friends surprised students and delighted teachers when we delivered grant funds to classrooms. The students clapped and cheered when we entered their classrooms and honored their teachers with oversized presentation checks along with colorful balloons and commemorative medallions for display in their classrooms. In total, \$34,350 in checks was delivered for 19 Innovative Learning Grant projects at 11 schools.




ADVENTURE BOUND (Berkeley)

Lost in Space is a sci-fi technology project covering 30 missions/lessons in 30 days. The 30-day challenge brings students from beginners to builders as they problem-solve their way out of being stranded on an alien planet. The Invento.io kits are reusable and teach students advanced coding and circuit skills in a unique, mission-based format that encourages participation. A retired NASA professor assists the class with transitions from one mission to the next, as levels of complexity build.

ROBOT SHOP (Berkeley)


Infinite Possibilities is a project that uses Arduino (an open-source platform) Microcontroller Kits to offer all students the opportunity to learn about coding, robotics, and electronics. It provides an innovative, hands-on approach to learning how software and hardware interact.



INNOVATIVE LEARNING GRANTS 2023

EXPLORING THROUGH LIGHT (Bright Beginnings)

A light table and its corresponding objects are a unique and interactive way for preschoolers to learn across many different subjects. Using light also helps to visually stimulate their brains. The students learn sorting, counting, patterns, letters, and literacy with different manipulative kits. This helps students discover a way of seeing everyday items in a whole new “light.”



SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL SUCCESS (Clara Byrd Baker)

The Slumberkins curriculum uses books and creatures to help students develop self-awareness and self-control appropriate in Grades K-2. Through this interactive and fun approach to social-emotional learning, students learn the interpersonal skills vital for school, work, and life success. The curriculum is adaptable to individual and group counseling and classroom morning meetings, and it will be useful during the school day and at after-school events.



ENHANCING LITERACY (Clara Byrd Baker)

Alphabet Arc tools recognize the diverse learning needs of students and engage young learners through hands-on experiences that enhance and accelerate literacy development. They support correct sequencing and letter sounds to promote letter identification, reading, and spelling. Magnetic wands and counters make segmenting sounds an engaging visual task. “Pop-its” provide kinesthetic feedback while isolating sounds in words. Multi-sensory writing paper assists with letter formation and attending to the physical properties of letters while spelling and writing. Play-Doh supports phonological and phonemic awareness. Mirrors let students see the place and manner of articulation when producing a phoneme. Highlighters and index cards help with word building and annotation tasks.


MAKING CONNECTIONS (Central Office)



Creating an environment for students to meet their deaf and hard-of-hearing peers helps them develop language skills in a social setting. Hearing-challenged students are spread around the school division by school zone, so they can have a limited awareness of others like themselves, making it difficult to develop friendships. Their parents/caregivers are invited to meet others with similar communication challenges. Afterwards, students are encouraged to keep in touch as pen pals, facilitated by staff, to further these relationships.

WE CAN BUILD IT (D. J. Montague)

These handheld manipulative objects are a joyful way to spark a love of science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) in little learners. Kindergarten students begin by using a LEGO kit to build moving rides in a theme park. Students in grades 1 and 2 create a design based on fairy and folk tales and then use a story card to solve a dilemma. In Grade 3, students use a robot to build custom mazes, solve problems, and learn basic coding. At each level students work cooperatively and then retell their projects, further imprinting the lessons.



HONEY, I SHRUNK THE KIDS (D. J. Montague)

Microscopes offer a hands-on experience that ignites students' imaginations and sparks their appreciation of the mysteries of the world. From a blade of grass to a grain of sand to the skin of an onion, viewing everyday objects and creatures through a microscope presents students with a view of the world they never imagined! Such engagement and investigation are essential to the scientific process and encourage students to want to learn more.

INNOVATIVE LEARNING GRANTS 2023

SENSORY HALLWAY (D. J. Montague)

A sensory hallway has pathways, wall panels, and interactive wall boards, corridor wall panels, and light cover filters giving students opportunities to recenter their bodies and minds so they can go back to the classroom ready to learn. Movement is essential to finding homeostasis (balance) in the sensory system, and these gadgets help students to reset their sensory systems and learn to self-regulate their behavior.



DO YOU FEEL WHAT I'M SAYING? (Hornsby)

STACS Kits help students with visual impairments communicate, make choices, and access the curriculum. These tactical symbols are a form of static communication recognizable by touch. STACS is a valuable tool for visually impaired students to record and retrieve information. Supporting their communication supports their access to the curriculum and their quality of life.


BRIDGES WITH PARENTS (James River)

These take-home backpacks contain books, toys, and handouts that focus on literacy, math, science, social studies, and fine motor skills. They're designed to cultivate connections between home and school. The materials change quarterly based on classroom focus, and they rotate throughout the class to engage students and their caregivers in activities that support learning and foster positive home-school relationships.



INNOVATIVE LEARNING GRANTS 2023

HANDS-ON EARTH SCIENCE (Jamestown)



Reusable kits provide a greater understanding of earth science as students discover how the world works. A kit that helps students visualize the relationship between 2D maps and the real world will aid in understanding how to use maps, particularly topographic maps. The oceanography kit helps students learn that solar radiation is the driving force for many phenomena within the ocean world - such as winds, water circulation, and food webs. Infrared lamps and reflectors simulate solar radiation and demonstrate it in the classroom.

MEN'S CHOIR (Jamestown)

We will acquire new compositions designed to develop and support the vocal needs of young men transitioning from youth choir to adult voice parts. They will provide instruction for 20-40 students annually and benefit a new group of students each year.



LIFE SKILLS (Matthew Whaley)

Practicing basic skills helps Kindergarten students gain independence - learning to tie their shoes, button clothes, and zip jackets. Practicing such skills helps build fine motor muscles and aids in writing and grabbing objects.

ROCK OUT! (Matthew Whaley)


There is a natural, palpable connection between rocking out in music and gaining number sense, and these guitars will help students in grades K-3 connect math and music while they also grow in musical literacy. Connecting sound patterns, length of notes, strum patterns, and chord progressions is an interactive and fun way to grow in number sense - and learn to play music!


LA GALERIA: HISPANIC ARTISTS (Jamestown/Matoaka)

This multi-cultural Fine Arts program promotes and explores Hispanic artists and culture by connecting elementary and high school students in a shared project.. A combination of World Language, virtual reality, and Fine Arts programs culminates in a community-based, multicultural art gallery. Students will learn about Hispanic artists in an interactive and artistic manner and create art incorporating a writing piece. Participants will gain cultural awareness and appreciation through exposure to the Spanish language and culture.



FLEXIBLE SEATING (Norge)

Some Special Education students have unique needs during pull-out time in math and reading. For maximum participation, some students find risers for standing desks helpful, and footrests with swing bars help others. These adaptations provide students with seating options that suit their needs and help them concentrate and learn.





INNOVATIVE LEARNING GRANT SPOTLIGHT



SENSORY-FRIENDLY THEATER (Jamestown)

Theater students learn how to create a theater experience adapted for special-needs students, who are often isolated from their peers and miss arts performances and programs. The school community will learn what it means to be inclusive. Theater students will learn how to adapt a performance artistically and in adherence with the artwork's copyright. They'll research and create tactile, informative, and comfort-inducing kits for their audiences and learn how to adapt lighting while retaining the magic of the show.



My JHS theater students developed many practical skills and got a strong knowledge base about their differently-abled peers and developed some wonderful skills in communication and empathy. **The day was absolutely electric, and many of my students commented that it was their favorite day of the year.** I believe that we have created a model that other schools can follow to integrate arts experiences for all students. **Without the financial support of the WJCC Schools Foundation we would not have been able to make the necessary adaptation that made the performance and experience so wonderful for everyone involved.**

The Teacher Supply Shop is a collective initiative between WJCC Schools and the Williamsburg community. To alleviate the financial burden of supplementing classroom needs, the Teacher Supply Shop houses donated items and makes them available to WJCC Schools' teachers and staff. In 2023, the shop filled over 1,100 orders for 600 staff members - representing more than 25,000 items that teachers didn't have to pay for out of their own pockets.
